Lucinda Mudge

Born in Brackenhill, South Africa, in 1978. Lives and works in Keurboomstrand, South Africa.

A major figure in the world of ceramics design, Lucinda Mudge has been internationally recognised for her unique vases, often described as "extraordinary" for their large scale, rich colour and complex detail. Her work has been integrated into public and private collections in the United Kingdom, Australia, the Netherlands, Italy and Russia, and is a reflection of her own familial environment: her parents ran a furniture company and her brother is a well-known furniture designer in Cape Town. Lucinda Mudge grew up in the midst of skilled artisans, and continued her creative journey at the Michaelis School of Fine Art. After her studies she left for London, where she worked as a photographer for Ralph Lauren, later returning to South Africa to undertake her ceramist career. Her pieces – tall, as high as a full metre, and bold with omnipresent political and social implications - are instantly recognisable. The designer adds varnish, bits and shards to create a thick, rough surface, incising simple shapes and images, such as childlike drawings of tigers and leopards, lilies or barbed-wire rings. Behind the brilliant surface of the pieces lies a world of paranoia and tension. She builds up words or phrases, embodying the human capacity to transmit ever new - and always contradictory - impulses. A satellite dish attuned to all signals, sensitive to the fear and violence that is part of her native South Africa.
