## BRETT MURRAY Brood



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15 October – 6 November 2025





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Everard Read London presents an exhibition of bronze and marble sculptures by acclaimed South African artist, Brett Murray, on the eve of a major survey of his sculpture at the Norval Foundation, Cape Town, opening December 2025.

This body of work traces its origins to the start of this decade and the artist's experience of the global pandemic. It marks what writer, Noah Swinney, describes as 'an idiomatic shift in Murray's work from polemics to elegy; a transition from what the artist has called, an accusatory position to one that is more compassionate and empathetic'.\*

The sculptural forms that Murray created while at home with his family during lockdown, became two deeply personal exhibitions called *Limbo*, which opened in 2021 and 2022, in London and Cape Town respectively. Murray's sculptures in these shows embodied the value of family and friendship and the lived experience that, in fraught and frightening moments, our brood and brethren take precedence.

This theme extended into a related body of sculptures and reliefs for Murray's 2024 Johannesburg exhibition, aptly titled, *Brood* — a reference to both family and the posture of fretting. In a world mired in conflict, uncertainty and political tumult, Murray continues to reflect and express our collective need to seek solace and safety and find

sanctuary in the humans to whom we are closest. 'These works are not argumentative, they're meditative,' observed art critic Graham Wood.\*\* 'They're not subversive, they're introspective. They're not about intellect, they're about emotion. They're not about politics, they're about relationships.'

For his London exhibition, Murray continues this intimate exploration through the creatures that emerged during the bewildering time of the global pandemic, and which continue to feel acutely relevant in a time of war and global turmoil. For some of his silent, animal avatars, the world seems to weigh heavily as they gaze heavenwards with trepidation, searching for answers. Others are brooding and subdued.

Huddled together or clinging to one another, many of Murray's sculptures convey a poignant tenderness and vulnerability. These symbols of the family unit — together, touching, protected, and protecting — strike a universal chord. While some works evoke pathos, others stoke unease and allude to an inherent violence. The hopeful is countered with gaping holes that speak to the loss and hurt that are an integral part of all human experience.







### **BRETT MURRAY**

b.1961 Pretoria. South Africa

Brett Murray is a South African artist known primarily for his satirically incisive sculptures and *The Spear*, a wildly infamous portrait of the nation's former president, Jacob Zuma.

His work functions as an introspective stock-take on the artist's positionality within the social climate of South Africa at a particular moment, with which he aims to entertain. 'In reflecting on what is unfolding,' Murray comments, 'I hope to articulate a very personal understanding and an idiosyncratic psychological sense of place, and begin to describe who I am with this anomalous vision. Paradoxically, through this critique and comic exposure, I actually begin to define a preferred ideal in which I would like to live.'

Murray has a Master's degree in Fine Art from the Michaelis School of Fine Art at the University of Cape Town (1989) and was the winner of the Standard Bank Young Artist Award in 2002. He is one of the country's most popular visual artists, using recognisable media images with the addition of a subversive and bitterly funny twist.

Spanning bronze, steel, plastics, print, video and marble, Murray's work grapples with the wars of cultures, the clash between Afro- and Eurocentrism, the old and the new South Africas, identity politics and the ways in which political discussions have been shaped for the worse by social media.

As an undergraduate, Murray won Irma Stern Scholarships in both 1981 and 1982. He won the Simon Garson Prize for the most promising student in 1982 and was awarded the Michaelis Prize in 1983. As a postgraduate student, he received a Human Sciences Research Council bursary, a University of Cape Town Research Scholarship, the Jules Kramer Grant and an Irma Stern Scholarship.
